We are pleased to announce news of our 2023 Conference Ordinary Lives, Extraordinary Hope taking place in-person at the peaceful and hospitable Hayes Conference Centre, Swanwick, Derbyshire.

Please note the change from our usual weekend format due to availability of dates. We hope everyone who usually comes will be able to make it, and that the new dates may enable some who can't manage weekends to attend as well!

We are grateful to Dr Clare Watkins from Roehampton University who has agreed to be our keynote speaker. Thanks to Clare for sending us the following Conference statement:

At a time in our world when much seems difficult, desperate, distressing and even hopeless, this Conference invites us to take time to rest in the great gift of hope that lies at the heart of our faith. For all that this is indeed such a great gift, it is often one of the most difficult for us to receive, to understand, and to shape our lives by.

Part of the reason for this might be that we look to the wrong places to receive such hope. The narratives of hopelessness confront us daily on the 'big stage' of world news: environmental crises, economic hardships and injustices, political strife and corruption. Perhaps Christian hope, as a counter to these stories, is rather to be found in the smaller, so-called 'ordinary places' of human living.

In this Conference we will explore this Christian 'hope-in-ordinary' – through Scripture, prayer and theological reflections, and through the discernment of ordinary lives of faith – our own and those of others whose stories we will discover. In this way we will encounter afresh that gift and living of hope which, in its very everydayness, can transform our often despairing and hopeless world.



Dr Clare Watkins is Reader in Ecclesiology and Practical Theology at the University of Roehampton. A Roman Catholic, lay-woman theologian, committed to teaching and research in the areas of ecclesiology,

sacramental and practical theology, Clare has a particular concern for working in ways that contribute to the integration of academic theology and faith practice, for the good of both. Her research brings together theological and spiritual traditions, with participative qualitative research of faith practices 'on the ground'.

Clare is the author of *Living Baptism: Called out of the Ordinary* (DLT, 2006), and, most recently, *Disclosing Church: an ecclesiology learned through conversations in practice.* (Routledge, 2020).

As always, the Conference will include well-planned liturgies to help us reflect on the theme. Further information will follow on who our liturgist will be this time...

CELEBRATING A JUBILEE



In a quiet corner of Ilkley, on the edge of Ilkley Moor, lies the Briery Retreat & Conference Centre. Established by the Sisters of the Cross

& Passion, the Briery is one of the longest-running retreat centres and this year celebrates its Platinum Jubilee as a place of spiritual renewal where those who come can find God in an atmosphere of love, prayer, healing and peace.

Purchased in 1952 from a retired Bradford wool merchant at the request of Rt Rev John Carmel Heenan, Bishop of Leeds, the Sisters of the Cross & Passion converted the house into a Retreat Centre. 1952 was a significant year for the Sisters as it coincided with the centenary of the founding of the Congregation by Elizabeth Prout. Initally the Briery was for women and girls only, complementing Myddleton Lodge at the other side of the Ilkley valley, which had been established as a Passionist retreat house for men and boys.

Mother Madeleine McHenry was appointed to look after the Briery. In the early days money was scarce and volunteers worked alongside core staff. The original chapel was a converted garage and was often full to the brim. There was little heating to warm the house and the retreatants slept in dormitory style rooms with a shared bathroom. Despite the basic amenities the support was tremendous. In 1958 it is recorded that 2457 retreatants passed through the Briery! Mother Madeleine made a request to the Congregation for a new chapel, dining room and single bedrooms, and in the mid-60s building work began. In 1967 Rt Rev Gordon Wheeler consecrated the Chapel and in 1969 he blessed the new dining room and accommodation building.

In 1970 Mother Madeleine passed away. A pupil wrote in a Yorkshire newspaper, 'To many of us she

was that bright dependable star of a grey childhood'.

In response to the Second Vatican Council, the retreat ministry with its broadened facilities also opened its doors to a wider ecumenical community. Anglicans, Methodists and Baptists regularly enjoy the peace and tranquillity of the Briery for their retreats and conferences.

A new team of Sisters came in September 1996 and the following year took on the leadership of the parish retreats. Later this progressed to gathering lay people to lead retreats. As more people requested ensuite accommodation, work began to create facilities for all bedrooms. This was completed in 2020/2021 and has been invaluable for retreatants after the Covid lockdown, enabling the Briery to continue to open and offer a safe and secure retreat house for visitors. IGR retreats and preached retreats continue to thrive as well as themed weekends and day retreats.

Despite being an old Victorian house with its charm and elegance, the Briery is now fully equipped with 'tech' including Wifi, loop systems and the ability to live-stream and record meetings and services in the Conference Rooms and Chapel. And delicious home-cooked food is prepared in the kitchen!

The Friends of the Briery, a group of volunteers, was established in 2016 to help organise events such as the annual Garden Party and other fund-raising and community-building functions. They have been an invaluable resource as they've funded so many extras that make The Briery such a beautiful and comfortable place.

The Briery has moved with the times and continues to adapt to meet the needs of individuals and groups, and its core values remain a reliable constant in our everchanging world.

PASSIONIST SPIRITUALITY REFLECTION

"The Passionist Charism is something that is caught and not taught!"

This is so true that the charism is first really experienced when we meet a person living it! So in meeting someone living in this tradition, we may feel ourselves drawn in before we can clearly articulate why! We are drawn to this person who derives their spiritual strength from a founder who lived 300 years ago, but whose vision lives on in different cultures and lifestyles. A person who made the journey from young soldier to lay hermit – finally founding a community of priests and brothers, followed later by sisters and lay associates. He is now known as St Paul of the Cross.

At the core of the Passionist charism is keeping alive the memory of the Passion of Jesus. Passionist religious take a 4th vow 'to keep the memory alive', especially by preaching.

Many lay people have adopted our charism as a source of strength and nourishment for their lives and fields of work in service of others. Paul of the Cross had a keen interest in praying that the future would bring unity again to a divided Christian World. Blessed Dominic took the Passionists to England, where the charism blossomed like a plant with many flowers.

A highlight of the year was the online Conference of the Retreat Association which took place in June 2022. Entitled Living with Courage:



clasping hands across a divided landscape, the Conference moved online for the first time and brought together a wealth of contributors from home and abroad.

Pádraig Ó Tuama made us all jealous by joining from Patmos, the Greek island in the Aegean Sea where St John wrote the Book of Revelation.

Activist theologian **Ched Myers** zoomed in from California, inspiring us with stories about his context of radical discipleship and restorative justice.

Jane Shaw spoke from Oxford, where she is Professor of the History of Religion, giving an overview of some courageous Christian mystics in the past including Julian of Norwich, George Fox and Evelyn Underhill.

Rachel Mann was in Manchester but joined Pádraig for a fascinating dialogue about courage, along with reading her own very brave poetry.

Questions like these formed the contemplative heart of our liturgy, led from St Katharine's Foundation in London, as artist **Carol Marples** guided us in participative meditations on what God wants of us, during the beautiful liturgies coordinated by Iona musician, **Alison Adam**.

Our patron **Graham Sparkes** and RA Director **Alison MacTier** hosted the event from St Katharine's, which gave us all a sense of shared place as well as blessing the multitude of individual places that we joined from!
