Listening to our Life will draw on what Richard Rohr says about God coming to us 'disguised as our life, which seems to be the last place we want God to be... It is just "me" and just "you" and just daily life. It is both the perfect hiding place and the perfect revelation place for the Holy One'. (Soul Brothers).

Many of us think that the blessing of knowing God deeply and living fruitfully in God's love is not for us. We don't see or celebrate our holiness because our lives feel too ordinary. Yet discovering ourselves to be the very people in whom God's life flourishes and bears fruit releases joy in us beyond our imagining.

We are called to respond to the rhythms of our living and dying as God's Spirit shapes us along the way. God's Spirit aches for us to see who we truly are, and to be free to love.

Listening to our lives makes it possible us to act in the power of God's Spirit. Alive in God's Spirit, we become those whose hearts sing, giving life to our families, our communities and our world.

CONFERENCE REPORT 2024

Noddfa's welcome starts at the door where a plaque reads 'May this house to every guest be a place of peace and rest'. Those guests find themselves in a house built with Victorian grandeur, set in majestic scenery overlooking the sea, but welcoming all with homely hospitality.

The theme of the conference was intriguingly titled



Send My Roots Rain, and it was led by Christopher Chapman. I had been in online workshops with Christopher; how refreshing to meet him in

person, underlining the precious gift of bodily presence. Using his own beautiful photographs alongside his talks, Christopher started by encouraging us to think about our own roots and the personal history that had formed us. He reminded us that roots work at depth and hidden from view and that the life of prayer is about rooting ourselves in God. He underlined the importance of relationship.

He used writings of St John of the Cross about the 'always of God' to illustrate how spring growth rises from winter darkness, resurrection comes from the darkness of the tomb, and Christian hope is forged in and through the darkness of struggles. Moving on to the continuing unfolding of vocation, he encouraged us to explore what might feel unsettled, uncertain, unsafe. As he offered the vivid image of the mixing bowl, he talked of the creative tension between tradition and the radical, asking 'Is the heart of the Church at its edges'?

From poetry and imagery, Christopher moved to the physicality of our bodies, and the need to take care of them. Jesus' teaching and ministry are grounded in the physical as he uses examples of daily labour in his parables and heals hurting bodies. Prayer, too,

can be a work of the body whether we adopt different postures, use actions, or focus on breathing.

As we become stilled and emptied before God, we are more able to notice the gentle movements of the Spirit inviting us to go with the flow and follow our joy. After all, Jesus said, I have come 'that my joy may be in you and that your joy may be complete' (John 15:11).

Complementing Christopher's talks, our liturgist, Avril Baigent, led us on a pilgrimage of prayer. She introduced us to new songs along with old, and

incorporated video presentations to reflect the themes. On Saturday evening she set up prayer spaces in the chapel for an extended time of personal reflection. Then Sunday morning's Eucharist drew all the threads together, as we joined in open prayer and turned symbolically

outwards – refreshed and ready to go into the world.

There was plenty of space in the programme to take advantage of the spaciousness of Noddfa – whether that was an early swim in the sea, a strenuous walk up the mountain, or simply a stroll around the gardens and, perhaps, the labyrinths. Conversations buzzed over meal tables as old friends reconnected and new friendships blossomed. The sustainability table attracted donations, and generous raffle prizes encouraged ticket sales.* As I left for the long drive home, I did indeed feel that Noddfa had been a place of peace and rest, and my roots had been refreshed.

UP AND AWAY

Christine Dodd reflects on CSN & our direction of travel

When the government announced on 23rd March 2020 that *'You must stay home'*, I doubt any of us could have



imagined just how things would have changed once the pandemic was more or less over. In many ways we now live in a different world. We are beset by concerns about the future, be it climate change, increasing hostility and division across the globe, or how things will work out in our own country. At a



more local level church attendances have dropped, people are used to working from home and are less willing to volunteer or to travel. So much now is uncertain and CSN, like every other organization, is having to deal with the fallout. It all seems a bit depressing but at the same time there are signs of hope everywhere, including CSN, which we ignore at our peril.

If you look at the home page of our website, www.csnretreats.org.uk you will find a couple of paragraphs about what CSN is and what we are about. At the AGM I took some of those statements and asked the question, 'how we might fulfil these better in our new context?' I also made a few suggestions to get us discussing.

I tend to think best in images, so I imaged CSN as a collection of balloons. Each of these balloons holds one thing that we say about ourselves – yet they are all held together by our closing statement: 'It is in sharing our journey that we find our way.' Every balloon is of equal value so there is no order of priority.



Balloon number one is labelled with the first statement from our website, namely that 'CSN seeks to accompany and be

accompanied by all called to know God'. The question is how might we do this better? We all know how important it is to journey with others, both for ourselves and for those we are with, but how are we to do that more effectively in the future? For instance, how might we share with each other more deeply? Are there any innovative and new ways to do this? Or how might we give more support to spiritual accompaniers or retreat houses?



Linked to this first balloon is the second, 'CSN seeks to create opportunities to gather and reflect together.' How might we do this better? Might we think about

something more local? Regional meetings or diocesan networks? Using modern technology more effectively? Might we sometimes have a CSN Retreat instead of a Conference?

The third balloon, 'CSN seeks to listen and respond to the changing times' is to do with finding innovative ways of responding that we might not have thought of before. There are many signs of growth to tap into, increased awareness of the power of nature to heal and hold, the growth of the need to be present in the now (mindfulness), silent spaces in public places (my local National Trust property now has one) and no doubt much else. Is there anything here we can learn from and make part of our life and work?

Our final statement (and balloon) says that we seek to 'be attentive to the Spirit'. How might we do this better? What will help us listen more closely to what God is saying?



The poet Emily Dickinson once wrote, 'Hope is a thing with feathers.' If you have an idea which you think
